

NEWS AND VIEWS

For those of you not signed up to the Osney Island email list, this is a report from Julian Le Vay of Cripley Road Residents' Association on the discussion of revised SPD for Oxford Railway Station by the City Executive Council.

'Colin Cook is not on the Committee but at my request had got agreement to address it and did so very ably on all the points in the comments we had sent round. On access he said what he had told us, that if there is an entry on the west side, and there will be, people will drop off there and its best the design takes account of this rather than let cars just stack up in the road, but it should be done sensitively to the interests of residents. He said good quality trees should be kept but some might have to be replaced but replacement should be good 'specimen' trees not planners 'lego trees' as he put it. He was annoyed NR hadn't reduced the number of staff parking spaces and hoped the Council could push again on this.'

In discussion, which was brief (but longer than on most items), it transpired that NR say the 54 parking spaces are dictated by their agreements with operators. It became clear that the Council are mightily fed up with NR. They believed they had worked very closely with the railway interests on the SPD only to have NR put in comments in August attacking the SPD for hamstringing commercial development (not our view!). The council find NR entirely dysfunctional, liable to say one thing on Monday and another on Tuesday, hopeless at keeping their word, and as we all know, disastrous at project management and contemptuous of everything and everyone who is non railway. The Council thinks

NR have got into bed with developer who are salivating at the money to be made and are encouraging NR to wring every pound out of despoiling our city.

That said, one thing that was very clear, and explicit, which we should understand: the City Council badly want this project which they believe central to the economic growth of the city and they fully accept the price is intense commercial development. The reality is that by comparison, our concerns about our lives and neighbourhood are more of a temporary obstacles to be 'handled'. Sorry to sound cynical but I think that is how it really is and many on the receiving end of other developments in the city would say the same, as I know. Colin is an honourable exception I should add.

The outcome was the SPD was approved but subject to directions to redrafted to take on board and incorporate the points made, including re-siting of the ops building, rethinking the RDW design, seeking fewer car parking spaces and so on. What is hard to predict is when (if!) anything will come to pass, harder because NR is such a mess, but given that NR are well short of funding at present and that detailed planning consent is needed, my guess is that the power drills won't be waking us at night for 2 or 3 years yet and possibly much longer. (You may have seen press reports that rail passenger volumes, having risen for many years, have suddenly plateaued and for GWR, fallen sharply...).

We need to keep on top of this, there is much work to be done now and we need to intervene in detail and effectively at planning stage. I, myself, will not be on Oxford from January. I hope someone will circulate the council minutes when available.

LOCAL HISTORY: UP THE PUB

From David Walker: 'Dads Army afloat' would be a more appropriate description of the Upper Thames Patrol, a section of which was based at Osney during WW2. Founded in August 1939 by the late Sir Ralph Glyn, for many years Abingdon's M.P., the unit was incorporated into the Local Defence Volunteers later becoming the Home Guard. Rather uncharitably referred to by the locals as 'Up the Pub', the object of the U.T.P. was to defend the upper reaches of the Thames from Teddington to Lechlade. A section based at Osney Lock was responsible for the stretch from Osney to King's Lock Godstow, a distance of about seven miles there and back.

The journey was made on the Sea Dawn a 20 ft cabin cruiser crewed by members of the Oxford Sea Cadet Corps (of which I was a member), and kept moored a few yards upstream from the lock and conveniently placed outside the 'Waterman's Arms' (now the Punter). Patrols would start at 7.30 p.m. when a small detachment of Home Guard and a Sea Cadet officer would make an exit from the pub to begin a leisurely cruise to Godstow. I hasten to add that the temptation to call at The Trout and The Perch was grudgingly resisted.

Returning to Osney some two hours later Sea Dawn rapidly decanted the senior members of the party to drink a quick pint or two before closing time at 10.00 p.m. The shift was then split into two with half remaining on board Sea Dawn and the remainder moving to a wooden hut placed on the Island side of the footpath leading to the Osney Mead Industrial Estate, which, at that time, was non-existent.

For the young cadets a night in the hut was quite an adventure listening to hair-raising tales of the sea related by the units paymaster Lt. A.R. Payne affectionately known as 'Wacker' while sipping mugs of hot Symington's Pea Soup. At intervals during the night a

Home Guard accompanied by a cadet would patrol the length of the towpath from the lock to Boney's Bridge and back again. The Home Guard carried a .303 Lee Enfield and the cadet a de-activated American Winchester Rifle - the last time it was fired in anger was probably at Custer's Last Stand - would provoke very little fear into any invading troops. Nights in the hut are but happy memories rekindled each time I make a cup of that well-known company's soup.

Many Osney letter-boxes are tiny (original door furniture preserved as a 'feature?') or A5 size, but a fair whack of post these days is A4. Obituary

Harold Lewis 1921-2017 of Mallinson Court

From David Ellis: Harold was born on Osney Island in the unnumbered house next to 105 Bridge St and attended St Frideswide Church and Boys' School. He started work as an apprentice chef at New College. At the outbreak of the war in 1939, Harold joined the local Defence Volunteers (Home Guard) and served guarding Osney Power Station until joining the RAF. During the war, he was wounded and was very proud of the fact that in his nineties, he still had a piece of shrapnel in his skull. Service as a fireman on the railway followed until an accident meant he had to give up this arduous job. His last years, after having to give up a series of mobility scooters – the last of which was smart blue sports model – were spent housebound. He died in the JR aged 96.
