January floods

The recent floods peaked on 18 January, when the Thames south of Osney Lock reached 3.58 m. This was lower than the 2021 event, during which it peaked at 3.73 m. The floods of winter 2021 were the most serious since January/February 2014, when the Thames reached 3.93 m and some Osney properties came very close to flooding.

The City Council and Environment Agency showed good preparedness and response in the recent flooding, including sandbag defences at Bulstake Close. Demountable barriers are available for Osney should they be needed.

Some goodbyes

David Walker

It has been sad to say goodbye to David Walker, one of Osney's longest-standing residents. After more than 80 years on the island David has moved to a rather luxurious care complex in Witney.

David moved to Osney with his parents when he was 12 years old. His family owned a garage and four-bedroomed house at 41 West Street — the site of what is now West Court. Here David grew up and married Mary, who lived with her parents at 55 West Street. The couple spent their whole married life living in their South Street home. Mary sadly died in 2018, aged 91, and their daughter Marilyn has been helping David at home.

We will miss David as a great source of local historical knowledge, a regular at the Waterman's and then the Democrats', and a cheerful friendly presence on the island.

The Old Power Station

Seeing the Old Power Station reduced to a shell, I am reminded of its unsettling presence in my childhood. What was this black, ominous shape looming over our garden? And why did it sometimes emit groaning noises? The creaking and cranking was actually the sound of huge



shovels being lowered to lift up coal from barges on the river below.

A regular cry from my mother and neighbouring gardens was, 'Look at my white sheets!' Washing drying on the line was frequently covered in black smuts, presumably belched from the chimney which I identified recently in an old photograph.

My aunt, like many islanders in those days, enjoyed swimming, and the power station outlet provided warm river water in an unofficial bathing spot. One day my aunt got into difficulties but was rescued by another islander who was a strong swimmer and, later in life, our local window cleaner.

Working life

I recently moved to Osney and am in Oxford part time. The rest of the time I spend in London where I am a partner in a famously absurd US law firm. I specialise in international commercial and treaty arbitration, so spend a great deal of my time arguing about things that have gone wrong for people, an activity I find surprisingly rewarding. Moving to Oxford was intended to provide a base for writing submissions and doing focused work. In practice, most of my time at present is spent on some very ineffective DIY, and digging flower beds. Nigeria has a bad reputation when it comes to governance. However, over the course of my six months' PhD fieldwork in Ibadan in the country's southwest, I became convinced that there was much to learn from Nigerian voters and politicians. In particular, there seemed to be ways of doing politics which were at odds with the dominant theoretical approaches in Western political science, yet appealed to common-sense principles of how to hold those in power to account.

In my forthcoming book I set out these lessons for good governance that is 'socially-embedded'. These include:

- that transparency should apply as much to social relationships as to budgets and documents
- that leaders should be 'accessible' to their constituents
- that the unpredictability of face-to-face interactions makes them a powerful form of accountability.

Osney Supercharge update

The Osney Supercharge project officially comes to an end in February. Low Carbon Hub plans to continue with the initiative even if they do not get government funding for a second phase. We now have 16 households and businesses on the island pooling data on how much power they are generating, and how much they are using through the day. Power comes from solar panels on their roofs and from the hydro. Several other properties on the island already had solar panels and we hope to integrate these into the data gathering. We can compare all these data to overall demand on the island and analyse the figures street by street. This is helping us and SSEN develop ideas about future grid design as part of achieving net zero.

As part of the project we asked for a charging point for an electric club-car vehicle. By the time you read this it should be in place, beside the existing club-car bay in East Street. It means Co-Wheels can allocate an eV to the island in place of the existing hybrid.

A new opportunity

Osney residents are invited to take part in grid-balancing trials using a free app called equiwatt. All you have to do is download the app and reduce electricity use for an hour when asked to. The Yoga Centre on East Street opened its door eight months ago and has welcomed many Osney residents for a wide variety of classes and workshops. We have also had strong interest from Oxford architects, including a large group of Brookes' students who came to look around and study the building. It was a squeeze, but pleasing to have an avalanche of insightful questions from these young professionals.

Oxford Open Doors was another success, with more than 100 visitors, to nose around or sample the free classes on offer. Soon after, the Centre received a Green Award from Oxford Preservation Trust 'recognising the contribution to Oxford'.

The Centre was built on the site of sculptor Hugo Powell's studio and his family kindly offered his final work *Dancing Phoenix*, which has been re-cast in bronze and looks magnificent in the garden.

The Centre aims to build a community bridging the separate disciplines and lineages of yoga. We are already seeing the young shoots of community, particularly at weekend workshops and a free class for Ukrainian refugees held every Sunday.

Network Rail (NR) work

We are waiting to hear whether the Department for Transport (DfT) will give the go-ahead to NR's new plans. Until then, NR refuses to allow any information to be released. I can, however, say that the extra time has given them the chance to sort out some of the problems that closure of the railway bridge would cause, including improved access to medical care.

Thames Water (TW) work on Osney Bridge

TW is now repairing and strengthening the northern footway on Osney Bridge, prior to replacing the damaged waterpipe. For a long time the Environment Agency (EA) insisted that no work could be done from pontoons or floating apparatus between 1 April and 31 October, because the full width of the river must be kept open at all times for navigation. After top-level negotiations between TW, the councils, the DfT, NR and the EA, the latter seems *at last* to have conceded that they will be able to provide occasional extra "intermittent closure windows", if necessary.

TW is keen to take advantage of the times when the railway bridge will be closed and avoid disrupting road traffic with lane closures at other times.

Oxpens Regeneration

The outline planning application has finally gone in. They are now proposing more housing – 234 new flats (50% would be affordable) -- 258 student rooms (the council says this would free up family homes), labs for R+D, office space and a hotel. It will be largely car-free. Oxpens Meadow would be expanded and there would be new green public spaces within the site.
