Power in Osney

Mark Van Oss, East Street

When the Saïd Business School's new Global Leadership Centre across the river is complete we hope to see an excellent conservation of the 1892 bright polychrome brickwork visible from East Street.

This brickwork on Osney Power Station was originally designed as an eye-catching celebration of the new industry. When the power station was opened, gas and oil lamps and DC low-voltage current were in competition with Osney's 'Oxford System' of AC. Initially this supplied just five street lamps, which had dragon finials. Within three years almost all the college and university buildings, many households, pubs and shops were electrified and we still enjoy the use of AC power today.

Water from the Thames cooled the coal- and refuse-fuelled boilers and steam turbines until the power station was closed in 1969.

Award winners on the island

Vishuddha Yoga Centre, East Street

As it celebrates its first anniversary the Yoga Centre, designed by Adrian James, has won a Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA) Regional Award (South). The award jury published an enthusiastic article in *The RIBA Journal* about the centre (tinyurl.com/mspvf5ew), which ends:

What is truly remarkable about the Vishuddha Yoga Centre is how well the drive for low energy and sustainability harmonises with the yogic philosophy of the charity that runs it. The use of natural materials, such as plywood and bare blockwork, has kept embodied energy low, while the careful modulation of natural daylight prevents overheating. This alignment of values gives the building a unique character and a true sense of purpose, making it a truly exceptional space.

The owners, James and Jacqueline, were also pipped at the post for a RIBA South Client of the Year Award.

Horrible history...in my family

An old photograph has languished in my shed for years. Relatives, I presumed, but no one could identify them. Until I found myself, almost by accident, at a family history talk. Up popped the photograph of the mystery couple. It turned out the speaker and I share great-grandparents, and the photograph was of them. This was happy news. However, as my newly discovered cousin continued with her talk, there was something disturbing in the lives of our mutual ancestors.

Thomas Clay, born in 1810 in Elsfield, was accused of murdering the gamekeeper of an MP. Thomas was a poacher, but protested his innocence of the murder until the bitter end. The judge said that the evidence was circumstantial, but Thomas was still found guilty and sentenced to death in Oxford prison. He was hanged there on 5 March 1836, a month after his wife gave birth to their son.

I like to walk through the castle area with its historical associations. However, when I do so in the future, it will be with a sense of sadness at the gruesome end of one of my ancestors.

Noise from neighbours

On densely populated Osney any noise from homes or gardens is likely to affect several other households. Please consider your neighbours. Avoid loud conversations in the street or garden, and inform close neighbours in advance about parties or noisy DIY. Council advice (see the City Council website) is to hold parties in a proper venue such as a hall. If it must be in your home, take the party indoors and turn down the sound by 11 p.m.

If you are troubled by noise, the first step is to politely mention it to your neighbour, preferably face to face. They may not be aware there is a problem. If loud noise continues on a regular basis, log each event in a diary, and record the sound. You can download the Noise App for this purpose. You can then report the problem on the City Council website, and send them recordings. They will only respond if the problem is ongoing.

Fireworks are prohibited between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. There are extensions to this for Chinese New Year, Diwali, New Year's Eve and bonfire night. This regulation is enforced by the police, not the council.

Be aware of flood risk

Mat Lloyd, Flood Resilience Officer, River Thames The Environment Agency wants you to be aware that it is changing the way it uses temporary flood-prevention barriers on Osney. We will provide the same level of protection, but in a different way. In future flood events demountable barriers will still be used in South and West Streets. Along the river bank in East Street EA staff will build a sandbag wall if necessary, rather than trying to erect barriers under wet and dangerous conditions.

Remember that the barriers are only effective in relatively minor events when water levels don't overtop them. In a serious flood which affected all properties on the island they would offer no protection. It is important to plan for flooding *before* it happens. Make sure you are signed up for flood warnings (www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings) and think about what you would do if your property was threatened with flooding.

Seasonal recipe: crabapple cake

Eleanor Dickey, Bridge Street

There are several crab apple trees in the local area where you might harvest fruit this autumn.

Enough crabapples to yield c. 1.5 pints when cut up
¾ pint self-raising flour
¼ pint milk
115 g butter
1 egg, well beaten
¼ pint + 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
½ teaspoon cloves

Wash and core crabapples and cut them into pieces no more than ½ cm thick, leaving the skin on. Add cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, and 2 tablespoons of sugar. Mix together and spread evenly over the bottom of an iron skillet or oven dish c. 9 inches in diameter. Combine flour, salt, and the rest of the sugar. In a largeish pot melt the butter, remove from the heat, and add the milk and beaten egg. Stir in the flour mixture until well blended. Pour this batter over the crabapples and bake in a hot oven for around half an hour.

Improving the Island's road surfaces

At last the two worst streets have been resurfaced. Unfortunately they ran out of money to give the same treatment to the third worst – Swan Street. That will have to wait until they come back on 16–18 October to micro-asphalt the remaining streets – probably South and West first. I'm afraid all vehicles will have to be parked elsewhere for those 3 days. You will get a letter nearer the time offering free parking at Seacourt park and ride car park, but I think you can also park in Ferry Hinksey Road.

Annoyingly, they couldn't get rid of the puddles that often form in the "channel setts" (i.e. gutters) in East Street, because improving the drainage would apparently make the street more vulnerable to flooding – extra drains would more quickly "surcharge" when the river level rises.

Air quality in Botley Road

The Annual Monitoring Report for 2022 is now on the City Council website. It shows the data from the four NO₂ monitors along Botley Road. The level of NO₂ has fallen consistently since 2016 (and it will, of course, be even lower this year and next year). The levels are now far below both the legal limit and the local target.

Community Recycling Centre (CRC)

The City Council has decided to remove most of the CRCs in September, including the one in Ferry Hinksey Road. They feel that they are not needed so much, now that we all have access to kerbside recycling. Most of the containers are owned by charities, which often fail to empty them regularly. They are notorious areas for fly-tipping, and cost a lot to manage each year. The Council will provide information as to where we can take books and clothes instead.

EV charging

The County Council is planning a large expansion of its Gul-e trial early next year, using cross-drains on the pavement. This enables households with no off-street parking to charge their electric vehicles from home. If you might be interested, please register here: www.gul-e.co.uk Details of more public charging points will follow, together with more electric car club cars.

South Street pump

Thames Water has concluded that the enormous puddles that formed in South St in early June were a one-off and that the pump is working fine. They will continue to monitor it. However, they ask you to report any further incidents to them on Twitter or Facebook or phone the Customer Contact Centre at any time on 0800 316 9800.
